**Course Description:**

The workshop prepares PhD students for high-risk fieldwork through the experiences of senior researchers conducting fieldwork in problematic or difficult circumstances. The aim is to provide a practical guide on themes that include but are not limited to interviewing, ethics, safety, community entry, field notes and mental health. An open and honest discussion about concerns between those who have already undertaken such fieldwork and those preparing to begin conducting fieldwork. This is vital to facilitate the translation of the often general and abstract ethics review requirements to case-specific needs and concerns of PhD researchers. This relates to the challenges of operating in various cultural and geographic environments with consequences for community entry, observation in the field and personal safety. These are affected by factors like gender, sexuality, race and class. The format is a two-day workshop.
