### Course Description:

The objective of this course is to arrive at an introductory yet nuanced understanding of the classical and some contemporary uses of the Marxist category of “primitive accumulation” in the humanities and social sciences. The course is not meant to provide a comprehensive overview of the debates around this category nor of the Marxist tradition. Previous knowledge of Marxism is not required. Themes we can expect to discuss include: the origins and historiography of capitalism, imperialism, state power/violence, gender, race, the postcolonial state, agrarian change, and the politics of the peasantry.

- You are uninterested in a close reading and discussion of Karl Marx’s writings
- You do not have interest/capacity for significant amounts of weekly reading (see below)
- You do not have interest/capacity for writing a short weekly response paper (200 words) to the readings
