Course Description:

This course will provide a grounding in how to design and conduct research using qualitative digital diary methods, including the wide variety of applications of this method. The sessions will cover when and how to use qualitative digital diaries, elements of study design and ethical issues, approaches to analysis, and potential challenges and solutions when using these methods. There will be a short task to complete between sessions to help participants apply learning to their own research, and the second session will be flexible to focus on topics and issues raised by participants.

Learning outcomes:

- Understand what qualitative digital diary methods are and when to use them
- Gain confidence in designing and conducting a qualitative digital diary study
- Recognise ethical issues around the use of diaries, and know how to address these in the research design
- Design an initial qualitative digital diary plan for your own project, drawing on examples discussed
- Understand ways of approaching diary analysis
- Understand how to write up and report a diary methods study.
