Course Description:

This module provides an introduction to case study methods, an increasingly popular approach to research across many disciplines and especially in interdisciplinary studies in social sciences, arts and humanities, and law.

The study of cases is attractive to doctoral students in that it offers a flexible research strategy that involves empirical investigation of particular phenomena within their real-life context using multiple sources of evidence.

It provides a solid methodological basis for comparative research. This workshop series offers students an opportunity to learn about single and multiple case study design.

The integration of subject, theory and method; specification of appropriate units of analysis; possibilities and pitfalls in using multiple sources of evidence; establishing boundaries between case and context; and analysing case study data.
