### Course Description:

This short course is aimed at PhD students of the social sciences who want to learn how to use the software R, a powerful and versatile statistical tool, widely used in academia and in the industry. In this course, you will be introduced to the R interface and the R language for statistical analysis.

After the basics, we will cover how to organize, modify and clean data frames (first session). Then we will learn how to perform descriptive statistics and create (pretty) data visualizations to showcase insights in the data (second session). Then, we will perform some basic statistical tests (third session) and conclude with mixed regressions models (final session).

Sessions 1 to 3 will last two hours, session 4 will last 3 hours. In all sessions, during the first half will cover the content and look at the code together, then you will have time to practice on some real data and ask questions.

By the end of this short course, you should be:

- more familiar with the R interface and language
- able to create, read and manipulate datasets into R
- able to summarise and graphically display data
- able to perform conventional statistical analysis tests
- able to perform mixed effect models analysis

### Pre-course preparation:

You will need to have R and Rstudio installed on your computer. We will use R Studio as it is more user-friendly than R, however, to use R Studio, you need R on your machine.

To install R, go to <https://cran.r-project.org/> and under the heading, "Download and Install R", click on the appropriate platform for your system (i.e., Mac, Windows, or Linux). You will be given the choice of downloading from a list of mirror sites. The download may be faster if you choose one that is near to you. The rest of the steps are specific to the platform that you are using. Then, to install RStudio go to <https://rstudio.com/products/rstudio/> and download RStudio Desktop, the free version.
